

Matthew continues Jesus' Sermon on the Mount in today's Gospel, which is Jesus' extended teaching on the central theme of his ministry, the Kingdom of Heaven. Matthew highlights Jesus as a teacher like Moses, and who is rooted in the law of Moses. Jesus interprets the law by intensifying its meaning, by going to the root values behind the specific teachings in the law. These include reconciliation with others; mutual care for all persons as sacred, especially women; and being trustworthy and honest.

The Kingdom of Heaven is described as both in the present and in the future. When these values are lived out in daily life within the community, the Kingdom becomes present there and demonstrable to others. Jesus also spoke about life in the future, when God fulfills the divine promises to establish fully justice and peace on earth. The reconciliation, care, and trust experienced now will reach their fullness in the promised Kingdom.

#### WITH EACH OTHER

Jesus' Sermon on the Mount today turns to the relationships within the community. Jesus understands the traditional teach-

ings about relationships in light of the coming Kingdom. He describes a deep trust and accountability among members of the community. Not settling for meeting minimum requirements, he points his new community toward an intimate knowledge and caring for each other, so that all may flourish as individuals and as a whole.

Although he highlights the dignity of each individual person, Jesus also envisions a community life where there is both a responsibility for each other and an accountability to each other. Members are to attend to each other's struggles and sorrows. Members become aware that their individual choices and lifestyle will be an example to others. We are to work out how to follow Jesus together in community, not only as individuals. We discern and live out our community's vocation, not only our own. Our unity with God is also with each other.

# Notes from Fr. Anthony ...




We know that in our relationships with people we truly love, we desire to be near them. Have you ever in your life been homesick? Have you ever had a sleepless night or difficult day when you or someone you love is away? How do we feel when we are away from spouses, siblings, children or grandchildren? As human beings, we are creatures that desire, even need, certain relationships as they give us the ability to share our gifts and talents, in particular they make it possible for us to love. To give that part of us that we hold dear to someone else that we desire to place there, to carry with us always. We are capable of making great sacrifices out of love for others in our lives. Now, what if I were to tell you that the love we feel can magnified, purified? That the desire to share with others that deepest part of ourselves can be truly sacrificial? That our relationships can be slowly perfected and free of the stain of self-interest?

I am sure most of us would be more than open to those possibilities. We would eagerly pursue the chance to build deeper and more loving relationships.

There is a way and there is nothing this material world can do to even come close to comparing with it. It is not some magic formula or pill or self-help program, it is not some form of exercise or breathing in a particular way, it is not about losing oneself in the creation surrounding us. It is about drawing closer and finding oneself in the Creator. The whole thing is based upon one question: How much time have we spent in Eucharistic adoration over the past month? Little time spent here means little change in the world around me. All the other good works in the world are a grain of sand next to being in the physical presence of our Lord. As we know, Eucharistic adoration is time spent before the Blessed Sacrament while in

the monstrance on the altar. At St. Isidore we have Eucharistic adoration every week on Wednesday starting at 5:30 pm. At Holy Family it is every Thursday at 5:30 pm. When was the last time we found ourselves there at that time? A common reason for not going to Eucharistic adoration is that we say don't have time. 20-30 minutes or an hour a week is not that much time in reality, especially when we think of how many hours a week we spend doing things that are of no benefit at all. Some may say that they wouldn't know what to do during the time. We can say the rosary, we can read a spiritual book we can just sit or kneel there and speak to our loving Lord from our hearts, all the things we are carrying with us: all our desires, fears and joys, pain and love. We could also spend some time just listening to what our good Lord has to say to us. We live in a loud, lost world that does anything to prevent silence. The evil one knows that in silence, first and foremost, we hear God the clearest. What are we doing to grow closer to God, in a concrete way? After the Sacraments, Eucharistic adoration is the next most beneficial form of prayer as we our placing ourselves in the literal, physical presence of God in the Blessed Sacrament. I pray that more of us here at the parish take up our Lord's invitation to "come to me all you who labor and are weary". If we are looking for solutions to problems, comfort, clarity, peace. If we are truly looking to make the world a better place. If we truly desire the good of those we love and their eternal salvation - anything at all that is good - it will be found at the foot of the altar. Our Blessed Savior waits for us in His love. Will we find the time to return that love?

#### What is this about?

Mysteries of the Rosary is made up of a seven 30-35 minute videos (one video per week) which will focus on the Sorrowful Mysteries. The first video is an introduction to the series. Then each of the five mysteries will have an entire episode dedicated to it. Finally, the last episode will serve as a conclusion to bring the series to a close.

### Will we be praying the Rosary?

No. *Mysteries of the Rosary* is a reflective deep dive into each Sorrowful Mystery. It is a great tool which can be used to deepen your understanding and prayer based on each mystery, but the series itself does not pray the Rosary or teach specifically how to pray the Rosary.

#### Who is this for?

Everyone! Families, single people, younger adults, older adults, and high school aged. Men, this includes *YOU* too. You do not have to know how to say the Rosary to come. If you frequently pray the Rosary, this should be an opportunity to enhance your experience. If you feel the Rosary is not for you, this may very well change your mind! Feel free to invite others.
