FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

We turn to the first action of Jesus' public ministry described by Matthew—Jesus preaching to the crowds in what we call the Sermon on the Mount. The Sermon begins with today's Gospel passage, the Beatitudes. Having just called his first disciples to form a community, Jesus begins to spell out what this community is all about. The Beatitudes lay the foundation, describing the primary values and practices, and the core identity of this community.

Jesus tells his followers, first and foremost, that they are blessed by God. The community will reveal its blessed character through its humility, meekness, and hunger for justice. Knowing they are loved as God's children, they will have open and pure hearts, free to be merciful, and they will be able to endure suffering gracefully. Listening anew to the Beatitudes, we remember how far we fall short of Jesus' vision. But we know God has gathered us, and continues to transform us, to receive the fullness of blessing.

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WHOM GOD HONORS

In Jesus' time, honor and shame were key markers for who is up and who is down in their society. Typically, those with wealth and power over others were to be honored. And in our own time, often we find ourselves drawn strongly toward having more abundance, control, and options to choose from. We avoid vulnerability and limitations. But Jesus says in the Beatitudes that the poor and meek are truly blessed, that is, honorable and privileged by God. How can this be?

Perhaps Jesus is first exposing the opposites to the poor and meek, the "rich in spirit." These develop such confidence in themselves, based on achievement or inherited privilege, that they isolate themselves from God, and either ignore or exploit others. Jesus also knew that the humble in heart realize that they cannot build an illusory self-affirmation, so they can be most open to God's affirmation of them. They can then become more deeply empowered to participate in God's work. God blesses and honors the open-hearted.

Notes from Fr. Anthony ...



Praise the Lord and pass the blueberries.

The subject of *Consecrations* in popular piety is one that seems to be making a little traction in the English speaking world after about 60 years of major laxity in this area. In some Slavic language countries, the idea of consecrations has been fairly well kept up with, as evidenced by the fact that the consecration of the human race to the Sacred Heart is renewed every first Friday during special first Friday devotions, which included the Litany of the Sacred Heart, adoration, confession and Mass. To that point, such was the case every first Friday at the parish I worked at in Burbank Illinois.

The first thing we shall look into is the word consecration. The word consecration comes from the Latin consecratio; from consecrare - to render sacred. In order to really differentiate this from the consecration at Mass, which is the highest and holiest form of consecration involving the Holy Spirit to effect transubstantiation, we here speak of consecration in the sense of devoting oneself to something or someone sacred, to make one more holy due to association. When a person consecrates themselves to the Sacred Heart for instance, what they are doing is devoting themselves in a particular way to love for and devotion to the Sacred Heart. By doing so they are opening up another avenue for the flow of particular graces into their lives, such is the case with any consecration. These particular avenues of grace are accessible to all, but primarily to those who value them and long for them and form a special connection and bond through a consecration. We can think about it in this way: picture someone who is a very good cook, they seem to have a gift in cooking everything well. We know that person is a very good cook, but let's say that we also are very good cooks (I have to lie to myself here for a bit, but it is hypothetical so I don't consider it to be a serious lie; more of "if I could cook, I would be a good cook, probably... maybe"). Now we have established that we are both very good cooks, however this other cook has a particular gift in making blueberry pies that exceeds what we ourselves are capable of. We make <u>very good blue-</u> berry pies, but this person makes excellent blueberry pies. It would make sense then that if I should like to

make excellent blueberry pies then I would turn to this person to guide and instruct me, I would devote myself to this particular attribute of that person. Such is the idea behind consecrating myself to the Sacred Heart of the Good Lord or His Saints or Angels. I believe that they are better than me in sacrificing or imitating God or loving God and showing love, so to improve myself I turn to them and entrust myself to their guidance to help me become better at it, as they are. I want to make excellent blueberry pies, not just very good ones.

There a few more prevalent consecrations and they always are graded in a hierarchal way. The first among these being consecrations to God, for instance the Consecration to the Sacred Heart. Next we have in order descending from the Divine Lord down to His holiest creatures, first of these being the Blessed Virgin Mary, our Mother. The most widely accepted consecrations here are the Total Consecration to Jesus through Mary and the Consecration to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Now the question may be posed "why does Mary come before the angels?" The answer would be, because Mary is the Queen of Angels, the Queen of Heaven, the Queen of All Saints and so on, as She was and is the only creature of God to be called Full of Grace and was the only one who was given the grace of such a special and particular cooperation in the work of our redemption. After our Mother we have the Consecration to the Holy Angels and the Consecration to the Guardian Angels. Following them we have the Consecration to St. Joseph and then consecrations to other saints. To finish, maybe we should spend a little more time this week contemplating these different consecrations and ask ourselves if maybe we should take one on in the immediate future. The end goal after all is for us to get to heaven and in order to do that we must become more holy. Consecrations can be of great assistance in that.


